All are invited and encouraged to attend.

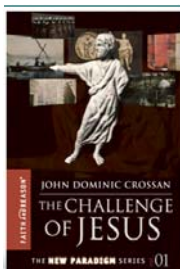


E-COMMUNICATION

ADULT EDUCATION STUDY CONTINUES THE CHALLENGE OF JESUS with JOHN DOMINIC CROSSAN

Sundays at 8:00 AM in the Grant Room, Rev. Bryan Breault will continue The Challenge of Jesus with parts 3 and 4 (The Death of Jesus, & The Resurrection of Jesus). It will run continuously for 8 weeks.

Attendance at all sessions is not necessary to benefit from the study. The Challenge of Jesus is a DVD lecture series. Each lecture is about 15 minutes followed by discussion. All are welcome. Child-care will be provided if requested prior to the session (please call the office during the week to request childcare).



Christian Education

At the last Ministry of Education meeting, there was much discussion about the length of the church school rotations. Members of the committee who have approached people have been told that five weeks is too long a commitment. It is true that not all rotations are five weeks. My suggestion was to have the first Sunday of the month explain the theme, play some games, learn some hymns, or the Gloria, and review how a service is put together. Kid fun but learning! We will use a few volunteers who cannot commit to a whole rotation. The monthly theme would start the second Sunday until the end of the month using volunteers who can commit to the whole rotation.

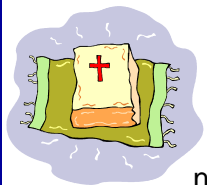
We would still need the help of the congregation each week, but our feeling was that a monthly theme would work well to keep the children interested and enjoying their time in Church School. It would also accommodate people's busy schedules.

The rotation for February is Ezekiel. Here is a brief notation of Ezekiel, an interesting prophet. Born in 622 BCE he may also be known as Nazaratius Assyrius, a teacher to Pythagorus. By some scholars this is untrue. At the age of 25, he was exiled with over 3,000 upper class Jews to Babylon. By the age of 30 he described his calling to be a prophet by telling in great detail his encounter with God. He prophesied the destruction of Jerusalem and its Temple, which was met by some opposition. Jeremiah, another prophet and contemporary, witnessed this fulfillment. Michelangelo painted Ezekiel on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel in the Vatican between 1508 and 1512. Come help and learn more!

We do need people to help with these classes. I have heard that some people are not sure if they can teach children in Church School. We have training, handouts, lesson plans and the materials to do these classes. Sign up to be an observer or to work with someone who has taught. It is fun, the kids are great, and we all learn together. Training for this rotation will be held on February 1. I realize that people may be away during winter break, so it might be a good idea to partner up with others to assure that all the classes and workshops have teachers.

Looking ahead to the remainder of the year, we do need teachers for the last three rotations. I am happy to talk with any of you about teaching classes, what to expect, more about the topics, and training. It is so important for the children to get a good foundation in their faith, for them to know the Bible stories and for them to feel how Jesus' teaching is as relevant today as when he was teaching his disciples and others.

NEW YEAR'S EVE DAY FUN WITH OUR NEIGHBORS FROM AFRICA

The soothing and comforting rhythm of drums and a potpourri of percussion instruments, soulful and joyful Christian music sung in Swahili, laughter in our kitchen while working together to prepare an authentic delicious African lunch, pleasant sounds of dining and talking together in fellowship with new Portland neighbors recently immigrated from Africa to seek a new and safer life in America, the meeting of minds and culture while discussing hopes and dreams for the new year - what a way to help close 2011!

In spite of ice-slicked travel, about fifty people gathered in Beinema Hall the morning of December 31. Social worker and professional drummer Frank Sanfillipo led a traditional drum circle mixed with piano, guitar, and singing. The hard-working kitchen crew followed the lead of some excellent Burundian cooks to prepare a feast of African-spiced chicken, rice, and beans, and ugali, a traditional side dish made from white corn flour.

Our guests all came to Portland seeking political asylum because of great threats to their lives in their genocide-burdened home countries of Burundi, Rwanda, and Congo. The most important aspects of the event were the conversations that 1) increased our awareness of the plight and needs of this immigrant population and 2) revealed to our new Burundian friend Jiji (whom many of you have met at our church) and his friends that there are fellow Christians in our country who care for them and are willing to help in their adjustment to a new country and culture.

We plan to conduct similar drumming/music/lunch sessions starting at Beinema Hall at 10 AM* the last Saturday of each month until the spring, when Frank hopes to resume outdoor Saturday morning drumming sessions at Deering Oaks Park. Watch for confirming notices in our bulletins.

The Sunday before Christmas, Sue Miller brought to me one of the most beautiful poinsettias I have ever seen from the morning service and stayed for a fun visit.

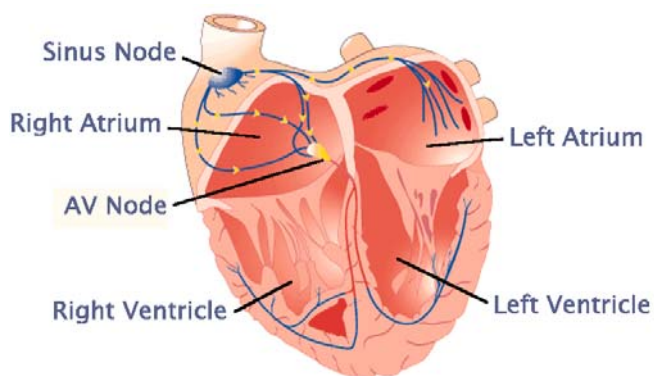

FEBRUARY IS HEART MONTH

In keeping with a *heart* theme I have chosen to write about *atrial fibrillation*. Atrial fibrillation or Afib is the most common cardiac arrhythmia seen by doctors today. Over 2 million Americans have it. It is generally not a life threatening problem but at the same time can be a nuisance to live with. One in four men and women over 40 are at risk of developing atrial fibrillation. The risk increases with age; it's estimated that 70 percent of all atrial fibrillation patients are between ages 65 and 85. People are living longer. By 2050 it is projected that as many as 70 percent of the American population will have Afib.

Atrial fibrillation is described as a racing heartbeat impairing the quality of life. When does Afib occur? The heart has four chambers or areas. During each heartbeat, the two upper chambers (atria) contract, followed by the two lower chambers (ventricles). This action is directed by the heart's electrical conduction system. If the system misfires at the sinoatrial node (SA), atrial fibrillation occurs.



Symptoms of atrial fibrillation can be mild to severe. They include the following:

- Fatigue
- Palpitations
- Shortness of breath
- Lightheadedness
- Dizziness
- Chest pain/discomfort






The risks to health include: heart failure, stroke and death. There are three treatment goals when one has atrial fibrillation:

- Restoration and maintenance of sinus rhythm whenever possible
- Controlling heart rate
- Preventing clot formation

Next month we will explore these three treatment goals. Meanwhile, take care of your heart by living a healthy lifestyle and Happy Valentine's Day!

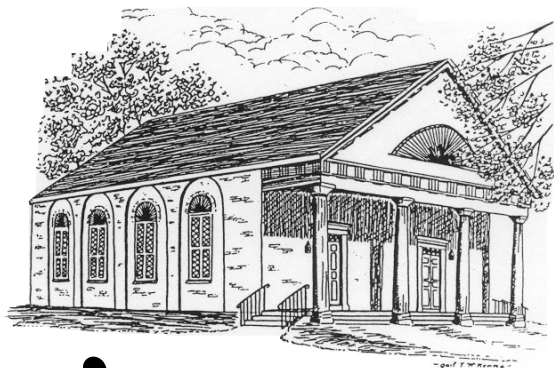
