#### Musings

April is such a transitional month for us Mainers. We go from some cold, blustery days to sun-induced warmth and the real greening of the landscape. In fact, I was awakened this morning by the folks who do landscaping around our building – much surprised to hear their equipment rushing the season. It isn't that I don't want spring (having not gone to Florida this year, my golf clubs have cobwebs) just that I'm still mentally and spiritually in Lent. But like everything else about life, I'm not as in charge as I'd like to think I am. Flexibility is called for....a willingness to roll with what comes. We've had to work hard on that during Covid. We've had to trust that, as Julian of Norwich said, "And all shall be well... all manner of things shall be exceedingly well." It seems we may be experiencing a sustainable turn in this pandemic. This is reminiscent of the rhythm of Lent – a long period of dormancy followed by unexpected, unparalleled joy. And we are now poised for that joy – the joy of Easter's resurrection and the joy of spring. There is much to look forward to in the life of this congregation, made known to you through this newsletter. Participate according to your comfort level; your church friends are looking for you!

Do you know Barrie Shepherd? I should say the Rev. J. Barrie Shepherd, Minister Emeritus of First Presbyterian Church in NYC? #### Hope Weed

Our Christian symbols seem, at times, not quite appropriate to the meaning that they bear. For instance, take the Easter lily, white and fragile sign of resurrection. Rare, its graceful silent trumpet greets the light of March or April only under glare of florists' lamps, unnaturally bright. You never find them in the open air

before July. A better flower for Easter Day would be, as every angry gardener knows, the dandelion, seeded by the gay abandoned wind that, as it listeth, blows. No matter how we weed out every stray, digging as deep, the root still deeper goes. And when, at last, we quit and go away the rain falls, and a host of fresh bright foes stands resurrected, and the garden glows.

#### $A\ Message\ from\ our\ Moderator$



Hi,

I want to provide an update on our COVID protocols going forward. Since the beginning of the pandemic, we have been following the science and guidance of the ME CDC and aligning with our local community and schools. Given that the rate of transmission in Cumberland County and most of Maine is low, we are making some modifications.

- Masking is optional for our congregation during services as well as for our Church School.
- We are removing the social distancing requirement, and thus the tape, in the sanctuary
  with the exception of the front section of pews on the left side closest to Fellowship Hall.
  We will leave the tape there for those who wish to be distanced. The rest of the
  sanctuary will be open seating.
- The current protocols for singing will remain in place so no singing by the congregation in the pews. We will review that in a month's time in hopes of being able to sing soon.
- We are bringing back the prayer cards. Prayer cards will be available on the table just outside the sanctuary in Fellowship Hall. If you would like to complete one, please do so before the service and give it to one of the ushers.


Don't you think I'm funny? I've BEAN practicing jokes all day!


Jim and Elena enjoy working on the house and gardens, as well as a never-ending list of projects.

#### Women's Spiritual Book Group

Last month, Pastor Amelia drew the connection between how we as non-Natives have oppressed Native Americans and our church's Lenten theme, "Cultivating and Letting Go"; that is, being humble before God and recognizing that we all worship our gods.



For April's Book Group at noon on Wednesday, April 6th, each of us will read a book about Native American culture. Pastor Nikira suggested <u>Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge and the Teachings of Plants</u> by Robin Wall Kimmerer.

Some said they would read about the history of Native American-White People. Each of us can decide what we want to read on this topic and how we might advocate for the rights of Native Americans. 
