#### From the Pastor:

The last Sunday in May we enter Pentecost, the season of the church year in which we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit. This spirit, which descends on the first followers of Jesus like fire and wind, is the force that started (and maintains) the church.

As some in the national news speak about churches being "closed," celebrating Pentecost feels especially important – for it is not our building that makes us the church, but the power and presence of the Holy Spirit. The church, at least Falmouth Congregational Church, is not closed. We are temporarily out of our building, yes – but the Holy Spirit is all around us, and we are on the move! Like the first disciples and countless generations of Christians before us, we are adapting to the world as we find it, working and worshiping and forming community in new ways. We are doing so while following the directives of the Gospel: to love our neighbors as ourselves and prioritize the "least" (i.e., the most vulnerable) among us.

This Church (You!) is making masks for our neighbors. It is getting groceries for those in quarantine. It is collecting diapers for the food pantry. It is educating our children about community and Christ; reading books online and posting YouTube lessons; conscripting our household pets to add pizzazz to the weekly children's moments. It is calling the members of our congregation and writing cards of support and encouragement. The church is worshiping, every Sunday, our good and loving God. The church is not the building, and the church is not closed!

Now, don't get me wrong, I miss gathering in our sanctuary terribly. I miss seeing all of your faces each week. I miss the coffee, and the singing, and the times of fellowship. I even miss the announcements! Our leadership is thinking hard about when and where we can gather physically and safely, and what it will look like when we do. No matter what, we will continue to Live Stream, so that all can participate even if they cannot physically join in.

There is more information about that process in the pages that follow, as well as an update about my Parental Leave during July and August.

I give thanks for this church on the move, and for all the ways your ministry shines the light of Christ out into the world.

#### **Council Corner for June**

I hope this finds everyone doing well and staying healthy. I also hope that everyone has been able to get outside recently and enjoy the sunny, "kind of summer" weather.

In May's Council Corner, I shared that the Small Business Association's Payroll Protection Plan approved our church for a loan. We received the funds in late April and those funds allowed us to retain our staff and avoid any furloughs.

At our May Council meeting, we reviewed the plans for coverage during Pastor Amelia's parental leave (approximately 10 Sundays from June 28<sup>th</sup> through August 30<sup>th</sup>). During this time, the Foreside Community Church will provide worship coverage for our church via Live Streamed virtual services. Our church will still provide lectionary readers and occamusic throughout the 10 weeks. Jane Stegemann, Minister of Visitation, will provide pastoral care during this time. We will compensate both Jane and the Foreside Community Church for their services.

The Council also agreed to set up a sub-committee to assist in the planning of a safe re-opening of our church. The name of the group is Supporting our On-Going Church Life and the members of the group are Cathy Bowden, Laurie Davis and David Giansiracusa. There is a separate article in this Congregator about the new group so I will refer you to that article for more details.

I also wanted to provide an update on the Solar Project. We received the structural engineer's report, which details what would be required to reinforce the church roof to support the solar array. Given that the roof is quite old, the work required is somewhat extensive. We are working with Goggin to get a quote of what the cost would be. We are also considering the option to install the array on the roof of Beinema Hall. I will continue to share more details as I receive them.

### Pastoral Letter: Grieving

This week (the last week in May) our nation reached a terrible milestone: more than 100,000 Americans have died from COVID-19. In less than three months more people have lost their lives to this virus than died over seven decades in the Korean, Vietnam, Persian Gulf, Afghanistan and Iraq Wars combined. There will be more deaths in the next few months, and there's no way to know exactly what to expect.

As we mourn these deaths, and the many changes, disruptions, and losses that this time has brought upon us, I pray that we will have patience, compassion, and grace for ourselves and those around us. We are all—ourselves, our loved ones, our church family, strangers in the grocery store—experiencing collective grief. As we start to think about moving forward or next steps, we are also struggling with anticipatory grief: we do not know what is coming, who will be impacted, what and who we will mourn. I have written before about Elizabeth Kubler-Ross' Stages of Grief: denial, bargaining, sadness, acceptance. These are not stages that we move through so much as places on a map, a landscape in which we are all walking. At any moment you may find yourself walking through a field of bargaining (mine sounds like, "If I wear a mask, and stay 6 feet away, and don't touch my face, I'll be fine...right?"), or on the mountain of acceptance ("I've always wanted to spend all weekend gardening—this is great!") only to be in the pit of anger ("that person wasn't even keeping a safe distance!!!!") moments later. I encourage you to be gentle with yourselves, and with the people you encounter; grief is exhausting, and we are likely to be grieving collectively for a while to come.

Collective grief cries out for collective comfort and support. I am deeply grateful to be in this community as you continue to provide just that. As I write this I know there are calls, cards, and prayers going out to the people on our prayer list. The first week of June we will bring hundreds of collected diapers and wipes to the Food Pantry. We will gather on June 12th to lift our spirits with a virtual coffee house. Each week we will gather for worship on Sunday at 9:30 AM to sing, pray, and greet one another. We will comfort one another as we mourn, and hold one another as we each do our best to find joy and hope in this time of trial.

The life of this church is full, and there are more details in this Congregator, on the website, and on the calendar. We are grieving, but we are not grieving alone. We are held in love by our church family, drawn into joy through service and community, and wrapped in peace and hope by our ever-present, ever-loving God.

I am grateful to be walking beside you in this time.

# Supporting Our Ongoing Church Life: An Introduction

The Falmouth Congregational Church's Council of Ministries cares about its congregants and the impact on all as the church functions differently during this period of physical distancing and uncertainty caused by Covid-19. In response, the Council has established an "Ongoing Church Life" group. Their mission will be to facilitate a God-centered,



inclusive way forward into a future that strives to safely meet the needs of the church community while incorporating the latest from experts in science, the leadership at the Maine Conference UCC, and the directives of the Maine CDC. Current Council members Laurie Davis and Cathy Bowden will lead this effort. The guiding principle to which they will frame all their work will be drawn from the Book of Matthew, Chapter 25, Verse 40: "Truly I tell you, whatever you do for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you do for me."

In the weeks ahead, the "Ongoing Church Life" group will develop recommendations for when and how to safely return to the sanctuary for worship, as well as, guidelines for building use and access, protocols for committee and social gatherings, suggestions for keeping the staff safe, and a response to the changing needs this unprecedented time brings. Members and friends of the congregation are invited to be part of this Covid-19 response by contacting Laurie or Cathy. Your thoughts and suggestions are valued as are your collective prayers during this time of discernment for wisdom and patience in this work and in our response as a community.



### FCC & COVID-19: Resources & Staying Connected

#### FCC Phone Team

The FCC phone team is calling our community in order to check in with each other. Please make sure the church office has your updated information so that we can check in with you.

#### **Grocery Ministry**

People in the congregation have offered to pick up groceries and drop them off "curbside" (eg on your doorstep) for any in our community who cannot go out. If this would be helpful to you please call the Church Office (207) 781 3413 and leave a message or let Steve Hendry, Chair of our Missions Ministry, know.

#### Soup Ministry

If you or a loved one need a pre-made meal volunteers will make chicken noodle soup and drop it off curbside. Especially in times of stress, or when feeling under the weather, brothy and protein-full hot soup can be just the thing. Note that, for now, this soup does have chicken and gluten in it and that it should be boiled before consumption to maintain our good health directives. #### Card Ministry

There are people in our congregation who practice a beautiful and tender ministry of card writing. If someone in our community would benefit from receiving a card, please let our Office Manager, Kat Roderick, know.

#### Mask Ministry

Outside the church there are cloth masks in a basket, sewn by members of our community to keep you safe for essential errands and appointments. This basket is restocked ~once/ week- please take only what you and your family needs, and stay safe. If you need a mask dropped off to you please let the office know.



#### **FALMOUTH FOOD PANTRY**

It is heartwarming to see how our community has come together to help each other during this terribly sad pandemic. During the current coronavirus crisis, we are not working out of our physical space at the Food Pantry, but we are continuing to serve families with home deliveries and a central distribution location at the schools. Not surprisingly, there has been an increase in the number of families who are being served; in fact, 40% more families are currently benefiting from the Food Pantry than were a year ago.

The Food Pantry is hoping to continue distributing free food several times a month in front of the Falmouth Elementary School for current food pantry clients and those with a food emergency. #### FAMILY PROMISE PROGRAM UPDATE



Greater Portland Family Promise continues to shelter families at a reduced capacity. We have two families currently. Emanuel and Dina and their children were with us back when we were still hosting in congregations, and they

are still with us now. Emanuel and Dina have 2 children: Eloimi (11-year-old boy) and Beneditte (7-year-old girl). Dina is pregnant and due this summer. Our second family joined us after we put shelter-in-place measures into practice, so most of you have not met them. The parents are Neolinda and Andre, and their children are Andrea (8-year-old girl) and Gabriel (3-year-old boy). Neolinda is also pregnant and due this summer.

Both these families have been moved to two shelter-in-place locations at two different congregations. At a time when families experiencing homelessness are more vulnerable than ever, these shelter-in-place options are such an important piece. A core group of volunteers is checking in with the families regularly and providing food so that they can prepare meals themselves. In addition, Wayside Food Programs is providing a box of food to each of the families on a weekly basis. If our families find housing and we do not take new families for a while, please be aware that Family Promise will continue to operate by providing care for our graduates, which is something that has always been done and will continue to be offered going forward.
