From BREAD and CUP to FAITH and GIVING

Dear Falmouth Congregational Church,

Each Sunday at FCC begins with community invitations. From a chance to come to dinner at a congregant's house, to an opportunity to bake for the Holly Days fair, to a request to pray for a sick neighbor, our life in a community of faith is full of invitations.

We invite because Christ invited us first. We gather, at worship, in service, for fellowship, in prayer, because Christ named and claimed us as children of God and said Come, follow me. We fill up our hearts with God's love and then go into the world, cups full, ready to share. This is what we remember as we gather at Communion: We eat at God's table, filling ourselves with grace and hope so that we may go out and feed the world. We go From Bread & Cup to Faith & Giving.

In November we have many invitations for you: This Sunday, October 30th, is Remembrance Sunday, when we remember our beloved deceased. We celebrate Communion and welcome New Members into our common life the Sunday after that. Saturday, November 19th is the Holly Days Fair, with Consecration Sunday (and fabulous music! and the dedication of our food drive gifts!) on Sunday November 20th. There is bread baking, a dinner for Church School families, weekly Bible study, Men's Group, Book Group—you are invited to participate, be known, and grow in so many different ways.

We will also be inviting you to fund our ministry in 2023. Pledges of financial support provide over 75% of our budget as a congregation. Without your gifts to the annual pledge campaign, we cannot engage in the programs, projects, ministry, and worship experiences that define our community life. The church depends on all of us.

Deciding how much of our income to donate to charitable organizations can be difficult. The United Church of Christ encourages a Biblical model of a tithe, a gift of 10% of one's income to charity. In our household last year we tithed 2.5% of our combined pre-tax income to the Falmouth Congregational Church. Each year we go over our budget and pray and think about how much we can give, while still being faithful to our other responsibilities as parents and new home owners. We aren't yet up to the 5% that we would like to be giving, but we do try to increase our pledge every year. Thinking about our finances up front during stewardship season actually helps us to be more financially responsible, and spurs us to have important conversations about our values, money, and who we want to be.

I share the amount we give because sharing honestly about our own giving, including our struggles and journey, helps to break down the shame, secrecy, and general discomfort that can sometimes happen around money. Stewardship is an opportunity for us to shake off our baggage about money and instead think about how we want to use our resources. The Falmouth Congregational Church fills and nourishes our family, giving us spiritual sustenance that we can take out into the world. If that is true for you, too, I hope that you will accept the invitation and join us in pledging to the 2023 Stewardship Campaign.

Stewardship of Money

Our stewardship theme this year is "FROM BREAD AND CUP TO FAITH AND GIVING".

Over the next few weeks, you will see and hear about our stewardship work this year. From the pulpit, member reflection, and in the Congregator, we will journey from Bread and Cup to Faith and Giving. We think you will enjoy exploring the theology of giving from its origins as a spiritual practice to the day-to-day impact giving has for our church, its kids, our community, and the greater world. We invite you to join in the exploration, listen to what God asks of us and hear what God returns in reply.

First, we love and appreciate everything everyone does for our church. Thank you! While everything we do is stewardship, we can also recognize that money is a significant material resource needed each year by the church. It is a powerful symbol, and it has preserved the ministry of FCC from a time before the birth of our country through to today. In 1754 Our forebears decreed that "Sixty-Six pounds, thirteen Shillings and Four pence be raised to Defray Parrish charges the present year." If those early congregants could talk directly about stewardship of money we can too. We can do so in a way that honors our theology, acknowledging the material and symbolic dimensions of what we do (and do not do) with our financial resources. To be a faithful steward, the Christian community needs to use money in ways that fund the possibilities of love, peace, justice, freedom, dignity, mutuality, equality and abundance. Can you think of ways our church community lives these ideas forward? Is the way our church is using its financial resources a demonstration of what we think God wants to make possible for the wider world, starting right here in Falmouth Maine?

Everyone is invited to join our church's 2022 fall stewardship movement. In the same way we break bread and take the cup at the communion table, we recognize stewardship as one of our sacred rituals, part of our core Christian practices, and an important Christian tradition our congregation embraces. Like other church rituals, giving as stewards allows another opportunity to form strong social bonds with each other, with our community and within the world. When we share our resources, we make a statement about the importance of Christianity and God in our lives. Similar to many of our traditions, stewardship is a covenant that we share with each other. What we do during our stewardship opportunity demonstrates our belief that God breathes goodness into our lives and that we want to be an example of a religious community seeking a more peaceful and equitable world. Giving isn't the only way to serve the covenant of faith with God, but it is an important symbol of our shared beliefs. Our doors may open to Falmouth Road, but really, it's our hearts we open to anyone seeking sanctuary, friendship and the promise of Christ. Faithful stewardship allows us to say, "And may it always be so."

We think our lineage agrees, spiritual ancestors all.

Hi,

It is hard to believe that it is already October but all the leaves in my yard confirm that it is indeed. And with fall comes our annual Stewardship Campaign which will officially kick off in November. We have special speakers lined up for three Sundays in November to share their stories and connections with our Church and why they choose to give. Pledges make up approximately 75% of our annual income so they are critical to us being able to plan our budget for the upcoming year. We all know that everything is more expensive these days and our church is not immune from these financial pressures. Please keep your eye out for a stewardship mailing as well as updates in the weekly email.

We have two key officer roles available on the Council starting in February: Vice-Moderator and Clerk. Both positions play a vital part in the Council. We will also be looking for at least one member at large to join the Council. As a Congregational Church, we run our Church so we need you! You do have to be a member of the Church to be on Council. If you are interested, please contact me and I can provide more details on the two officer roles or being a general member.

We kicked off our bylaws review in October and will be excited to share our revisions at the Annual Meeting in January.

Year-to-date financial performance is now behind budget. Through September we have a net loss of about \$17k. Some of that is due to timing of some expenses vs. budget, it being a three-payroll month and higher electric and oil costs. Please keep your pledges coming in. We are just about on budget for year-to-date pledges. And now that we are passing the plate again during the offering we are getting higher plate donations. And we are hoping and praying for a successful Holly Days Fair. We will keep a close eye on things as we close out the fiscal year.

In August of 2003 Mark was in a traumatic automobile accident in which he lost his left arm. Following the accident God directed him to a wonderful way of using his talents. He adapted to playing with feet and one hand, but he also saw the birth of The Mark Thallander Foundation, which has presented Festival concerts to the glory of God all over the country, in Hawaii and Canada. Most recently his foundation sponsored the Ken Medema concert in Dover, NH.


