Dear Falmouth Congregational Church,

Recently a new theme has started to enter into our conversations: firsts. The first dinner out after a year. The first time hosting a friend inside. The first trip to see the grandchildren. The first time back to in-person worship.

We are emerging. Some of us are bursting out (my mom was on a plane to California the day she was fully vaccinated!) while some are moving more cautiously. We are living into our new realities at our own pace, and in light of our own circumstances.

In the church this is a season of emerging, too. Christ has emerged from the tomb, and the disciples (and the world) are moving at their own pace, taking in the new reality that they have been ushered into.

Emerging takes time — it doesn't happen overnight, and it doesn't happen at the same rate for everyone. Maybe this is why the Easter season is 50 days long — 10 days longer than Lent. ### *A Message from our Moderator*



Hi – I hope everyone is doing well and enjoying Spring!

I will start with a quick update on Church finances. We closed the first quarter with total income of \$69k and net income of \$9k. Those are very positive results. I appreciate everyone getting their pledges in on time to help support the good work of our church. We do have some unexpected expenses hitting us in Q2 (mostly building maintenance) so Q2 may be a bit more challenging. We are seeing higher plate offerings now that we are back in-person for Sunday worship and some of our renters have returned. Hopefully, those trends will continue as more and more people are vaccinated.

At our annual meeting in 2020, we gave approval for a team to look at options to renovate the kitchen in Beinema Hall. Ken Bowden and Paul Davis have worked with an architect to design a commercial grade kitchen for us. The Council reviewed the plans at our last meeting and gave them approval to continue with their planning - securing appropriate permits and lining up the contractors. Most of the work will be done over the summer. Many people who donated money toward the solar project have agreed to instead donate their money toward the kitchen renovation. As you all know our kitchen is used a lot not only by our church members, but also by members of the community for things like the Community Supper and Family Promise. We will continue to keep everyone updated on the kitchen plans. If you would like to donate, please contact Jeaneen Coleman.

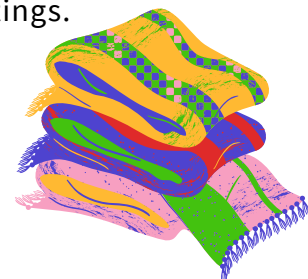

# Women's Spiritual Book Group: We Are All Seekers

I suspect that all of us at Falmouth Congregational Church are seekers, somewhere on a path of discovering what God means to us, what we believe about the Bible, what the stories of Jesus and His teachings mean to us.

During April the participants in the Women's Spiritual Bible Group read Tired of Apologizing for a Church I Don't Belong To: Spirituality without Stereotypes, Religion without Ranting by Rev. Lillian Daniel. On April 7, 13 women held a spirited discussion about the book on Zoom. (You really must read the book to discover its messages.)

One of the take-away's from our discussion is that none of us is complete in our faith. We are vulnerable in not knowing everything about the Bible, unclear about what we believe, or even being uncertain about our personal commitment to God. Our church gives us many different avenues to examine our faith, our commitment to God and to the teachings of Jesus: Bible Study, Pastor Amelia's message in weekly worship, the Women's Spiritual Book Group, small groups that Pastor Amelia has formed during different liturgical seasons, Church School for our children, to name a few.

This led to the question: **Why do I come to church? Why am I involved in this church community?**

For me, I come to church to worship God. Listening to the sermon and readings, speaking the prayers, and singing hymns are all gifts. While absorbing those words into my heart and brain, my connection to God deepens. Some phrases stay stuck in my mind all week, and they guide me. The more I've considered my faith and the more I pray, the more strength I get from God and the more support I feel from my church community.

Perhaps this is a good way for any of us to talk to visitors to worship or others who are thinking about attending church but haven't decided to do so: Talk about your own reasons and take-away's from being part of this faith community.

The Book Group also asked the question: **What does God want for this group in the coming year?**

Ministries: What if each ministry asked this question at the start of each year and then summarized the results of God's guidance in the Annual Report?

Just some thoughts coming out of the Women's Spiritual Book Group. What are your answers to these questions?

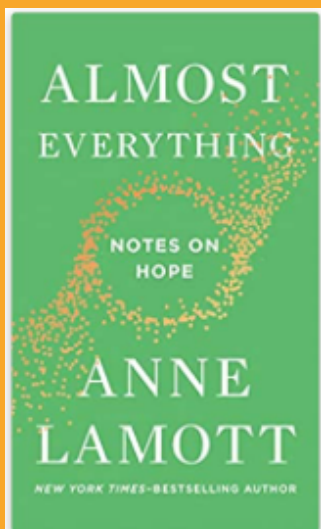


**Wednesday, May 5th at Noon**

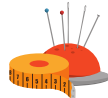
